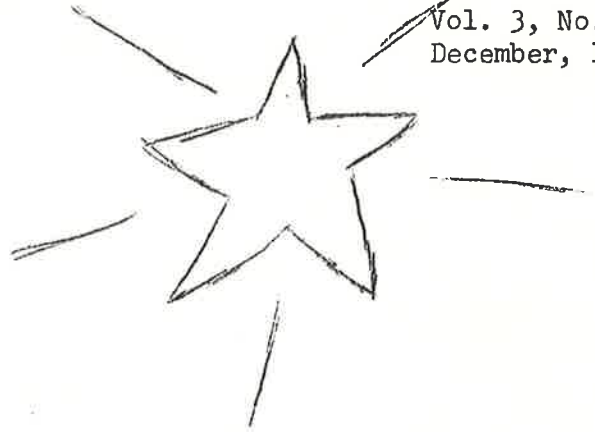
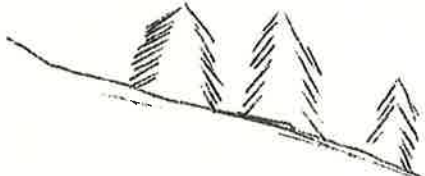

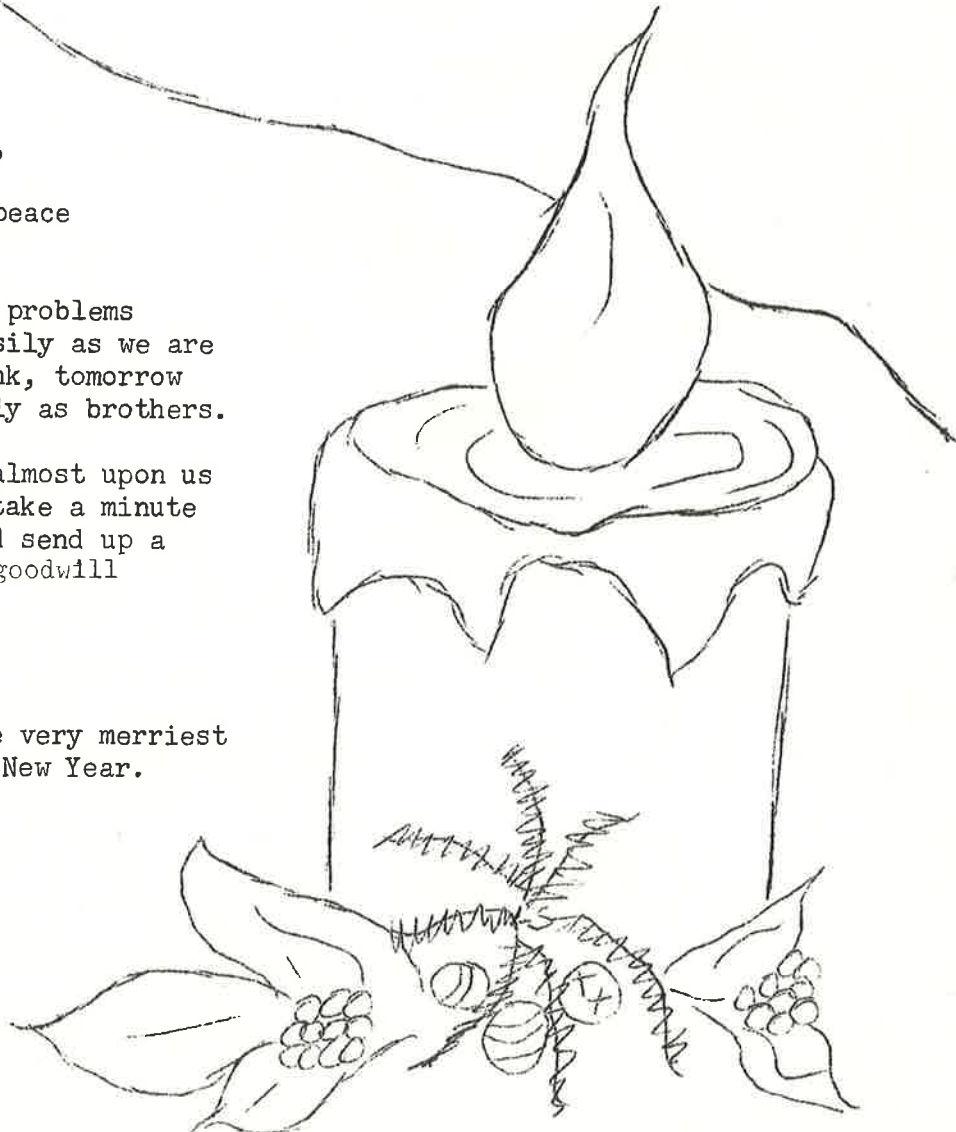


With man going to the moon

Thanksgiving and Christmas Baskets: We are currently working to arrange and coordinate help for Christmas baskets.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Sherwood Friends Church - Sherwood, the Tualatin Methodist Church, Sherwood Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints, Beaverton Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority and Newberg Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority for their help in providing Thanksgiving baskets for some of the needy families in our area.

Emergency Help: Disaster struck a family living in the Tualatin area last month. They were burned out of their home, but fortunately none of the family were injured. They were reported to our office as being in need of clothing and bedding. The Press and the Tri-City Times newspapers ran articles asking for help for the family.

The Norwood Church, Sherwood and the Tualatin Methodist Church, the Cub Scouts, and many individuals responded to the call for help. The family received clothing, bedding, food, and were offered furniture, available when they can use it. This was truly a wonderful example of community action.

Another family of seven persons in Tigard were in need of emergency help, due to the husband being hospitalized and they had no income. Clothing was provided by our office, and the Tigard Masonic Lodge answered an appeal to install a clothes dryer for the family. Other temporary help was obtained through the Welfare Department.

Emergency medical care was found for another Tigard family when a specialist in Beaverton consented to take the case. Transportation was provided to the doctor, and later home from the hospital. (These are just a few of the emergencies this month.)

Abundant Food: Eleven families were assisted in obtaining abundant food. Food was picked up and delivered to nine families. One was furnished transportation to pick up her own food.

Clothes Closet: Six families were assisted by being given needed clothing this month.

In-kind Contributions: (Donations of time, helping chaperone at the youth center, work in the restaurant, helping with transportation, etc., and clothing and furniture.) This month thirty individuals donated time and clothing, and some furniture totaling \$695.58 in value. From January, 1969 through November, 1969, a total of \$8,367.00 has been donated to our office as in-kind contributions. This is not cash contributions but value given to help.

Employment: Nine job referrals were given. Two persons obtained employment. Fowler Junior High School teacher, Mrs. Coffeen, and our office are combining efforts on an employment program for boys and girls in their early teens. Potential employers are being contacted for odd jobs that these young people can do. Anyone having such jobs as delivery boy, yard work, babysitting, cleaning, or other suitable employment, should call our office.

GED Classes: Eight persons are attending classes each Wednesday night from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Henry Truax, from Beaverton, is conducting the classes. Mrs. Hunnecut, a resident of Sherwood, is continuing home tutoring. GED Classes will be discontinued for the month of December. Classes will resume Wednesday, January 7, at 7:00 p.m.

Clinics: Thursday, November 20, a well-child and immunization clinic was held at the American Legion Hall in Sherwood. Twenty-two children received immunizations, and twelve children were examined by the doctor. Dr. Grauch, and nurses, Gretta Dahnke and Helen Kivett, presided. Volunteers helping with the clinic were Lois Dalton and Kathy Walsh. Karen Beaudonin assisted with transportation.

Headstart Recruitment: Jean Taggert, of the Head Start staff, has been calling on new families, hoping to find children eligible to attend Head Start classes. There are a few vacancies due to families moving from the area. Sometimes it takes a little while for Mrs. Taggert to contact families, as she is working only three hours a day.

Youth Center: A meeting was held at the Tri-City Community Center office at our request, on Monday, November 24. Sherwood school officials, our local police, and other interested persons from our area attended.

How to enforce "no smoking" if under eighteen years of age, has been of great concern to all of us. Several ideas were discussed on this subject, but we are still open to suggestions.

Everyone present at the meeting agreed that more community involvement and understanding would be of great help. Many persons and organizations wanted a place for the youth to go for activities and recreation ~~that~~ were chaperoned, but, we find only a certain group of people are willing to donate their time. Many others sit back and criticize--without coming near the center to really know what is going on. Some of these ~~same~~ people don't know the time we spend counseling these kids to stay in school; help them to enter GED classes if they are drop-outs; send them to the Tualatin Valley Guidance Clinic, if they need this type of counseling; help them to get job training through the Youth Opportunity Center; or just encourage them to get jobs.

We would like to invite any of the people in our community who are truly interested in the welfare of our youth, to become more involved in chaperoning or find out how they can help.

We were very happy to welcome about fifty adults who attended the "Head Start" Open House, the evening of November 25, at North Plains.

METZGER HEAD START NEWS:

Children from seventeen families are enrolled in the Metzger Head Start. Several more children are expected to register in the near future, which will bring the program to the classroom limit of twenty.

The staff of the Head Start Program consists of Lorraine Heller - head teacher, Alison Phemister - contributing full time as a teacher, Margaret Sanchez - teacher's aide, Jean Taggart - parent advisor, and Dolores Prebe - bus driver and cook.

We are glad to report we have had excellent parent participation, as volunteers and as an interested study group. Mothers of the children help in the classrooms, and assist with meal and snack preparation in the kitchen. They also volunteer their services to help with transportation and baby sitting for meetings. A family potluck held on November 21 was attended by 59 people.

Another project undertaken by the Metzger Head Start Mothers has been the establishment of a hospitality room. This room is staffed by volunteers and is used for many things, including a clothing exchange - among families in the school - and also as a receiving location for donations of food, clothing and toys, to be used in the Head Start program, or passed on to families who can use them. This room is also used each Monday as the meeting place for the Parent Study Group. A volunteer Mother is on duty during the hours the Head Start classes are open to serve coffee to staff members who may have a few minutes break, and to greet and offer assistance to visitors to the Metzger Head Start.

The Multi-service Center is now an official Job Bank Station. The Job Bank is a list or bank of jobs available in Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, Clark and Columbia counties. Each morning Tom Richardson, who is coordinating the Washington County Community Action Manpower Program, picks up the Job Bank book from the Hillsboro Employment Service office.

The job bank has made between 500 - 1500 potential jobs available each day.

A training session on the use of the Job Bank, was attended by Tom Richardson and Jerry Anderson, MSC Director, three weeks ago in St. Helens, Oregon.

In recent weeks the concept of the Multi-service Center has been changing. At one time it was thought that representatives of the various agencies could be out-stationed in the Center. However, because of time limitations of agency personnel and limited space at the Center, a different approach is now in operation. The MSC staff is working to inform community residents and the Centers outreach staff of services that are available. They make direct referrals or provide information to Neighborhood Centers staff so they can make the required referrals. The MSC staff also works with the Neighborhood Centers to implement various projects - such as the North Plains red card project, the Gaston Survey and the Timber and Glenwood Water projects.

Volunteer Service Bureau: The Multi-service Center staff members are working with a number of community groups and individuals to provide meaningful outlets for people who want to do volunteer work. Ten high school girls are helping Mexican-American children to improve their communications skills. Two women are ready to begin working with the GED and Basic Education classes under the direction of Kate Wyckoff, GED Instructor at Forest Grove and Hillsboro. After they have completed this training they will then be ready to conduct new classes in other areas.

Andrea Jackson, a Lewis and Clark College student, is spending much of her Christmas vacation doing volunteer work for Washington County Community Action. She is especially interested in interpreting Spanish, and has already had an opportunity to use her skills. She came to the center to offer her services, and was put to work immediately. We need many more volunteers like Andrea Jackson, and hope to see this type of community involvement expand rapidly.

A brochure is being prepared that will inform and interest people in volunteer work. It will be distributed in January.

Duane Wygardt, Portland State work/study student, has just about completed the preliminary work for the Master Resource Directory. Most agencies have returned the questionnaire forms which were prepared to compile information. The Master Resource Directory will be ready early in 1970.

Linda Matson, Pacific University intern, has been assisting Duane, but is now being transferred to other areas. She will be working with staff in contacting people in their homes in order to gain experience in interview techniques, and to become better acquainted with the problems of low-income people.

We have run into a small barrier, however, about burning the trash on the lot, because we have not been able to get a burning permit. As soon as we can get the permit, we will be on our way again. It will really be exciting to watch the new community center grow in the coming months.

Many of the volunteers who are helping with the survey at the Upper Tualatin Center are again hard at work, now that Thanksgiving is over. The names of the volunteers are Bonnie Henry - Laurelwood; Vernice Durand - Cherry Grove; Mrs. Edna Kintz - Scoggins Valley; Jo Britton - Dilley; and Mrs. Cullers, Jerry Nutt and Andrea Jackson, who are handling the survey in Gaston. Gonzala Lira is in charge of the survey for the Mexican-American people. We hope to have the outcome of this survey to report to you for next month's news article. It will be interesting to see what our main needs are found to be in this area.

We are finally getting back on our feet with Head Start. The Women's Fellowship of the Methodist Church at Forest Grove is going to sponsor us so we can get started. Our main concern at the present time is finding a location for our Head Start Program.

Our office has been busy during this last month with employment and housing requests. We are badly in need of low-cost housing in our area, and our efforts will have to be directed to this problem in the near future. We do wish, more than anything, that we could have a list of available houses, if there were any, that we could turn to when needed - but this is really dreaming, I guess.

Employment: Three job referrals were given to persons looking for work during this last month. One of these was employed through the N.Y.C. program.

Adult Education: GED classes, also Basic Education, formerly held at the North Plains Center and Hope Center (Manning) have been discontinued. Classes are now being held at Banks High School at Banks, Room #2 on Monday and Wednesday every week from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Six students are enrolled. We are trying to arrange a car pool from North Plains to Banks, for those who wish to attend, but do not have transportation.

Head Start: Eighteen children are attending the Headstart classes being held at the North Plains Center, and things are really going great. On November 25, an open house was held at the Center for Head Start parents and other interested persons. Approximately fifty people attended the event.

Clinics: There will be a well-baby and immunization clinic at the North Plains Center on Thursday, December 11, from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m.

The children of the North Plains Head Start Program are the happy recipients of a Yum-Yum tree, four feet tall and loaded with candies and cookies. This very attractive and delicious gift was presented to them by the North Plains Home Extension Unit and will be an important part of the Head Start Christmas Party planned for the near future.

GED Class: The GED class formerly held at the Hope Community Center has been discontinued. Classes are now held at Banks High School, Room #2, every Monday and Wednesday at 7:30 p.m., for residents of the Hope Community Center area. Roy Vann continues as the Instructor.

N.Y.C. An addition to our staff is Nate Alexander from the Neighborhood Youth Corp. Nate will help Naomi Nichols and Theresa Carson at the Community Center. In his spare time Nate will be completing his first semester of his junior year. In January, he will return to school, but will continue as a part-time NYC worker for the Center.

Teen Charm Club: A new and very popular activity at Hope Center is the Teen Charm Club. Under the direction of Mrs. Bea Kuykendall, assisted by Mrs. Pat Shaddon, ten junior high and high school girls from our area are enrolled in a free course in charm. The course will include instruction in proper posture, poise, makeup, hair-styling, social graces and many other things.

Mrs. Shaddon contacted many local merchants, including those in Hillsboro and Forest Grove, and was happy to report that just about every merchant she asked responded with a contribution of either cosmetics or clothing for the use of the club.

The course will last for eight weeks and if there is a demand, a second course will be offered for another group. Plans include movies on subjects of interest to the girls, shopping trips to learn about wise buying, and contests in self-improvement. Any girls interested in registering for the second course are invited to contact the center.

Thanksgiving Day was a lot happier for a local elderly couple who were helped as the result of a last minute appeal from CAP to several public-spirited citizens. Reverend Lester Wood, Pastor of the Buxton Assembly of God Church, responded to a Wednesday afternoon call for help with a magnificent basket of Thanksgiving delicacies, including turkey and all the trimmings. Reverend Wood stopped by on his way to church that night to leave the food at the Hope Center. Theresa Carson, our secretary, contacted the Gaston Community Center, and with the help of her sister, Mrs. Jo Britton, and other people from that area, provided several more large bags full of food. Our thanks to these persons who answered a call for help in just three hours time.

Mrs. Eva Jeppeson, Grange Master, donated some chicken. Mr. and Mrs. Roy Tudor visited the family Thanksgiving morning, taking time from a busy schedule (with seven children) to take some good things to this family. Heartwarming, that's what it was!

Poster Committee: Hope Community Center is fortunate in counting among its helpers several very talented artists who generously contribute their talents whenever posters are required to publicize some CAP event. We have a play in the works for Christmas, and our new NYC helper, Nate Alexander, is adapting "How the Grinch stole Christmas". H O U S I N G

Recent studies by the Columbia River Association of Governments show 1,184 adequate units needed by desperately poor households as follows:

1. 408 elderly people existing on cash incomes of less than \$60.00 per month.
2. 596 families living on ADC or less than ADC payments.
3. 180 large migrant families living on less than \$3,000 per year.

A 1968 Health Department study shows 1,321 sub-standard houses in the county.

Washington County Community Action Organization Board of Directors placed HOUSING on its list of priorities with the stated goals for the coming program year:
 "Provision of adequate housing for 120 low-income families using federal and local assistance programs. Assist in establishing operational public housing through a Section 23 leasing program with a funded unit allocation from HUD, and to be administered by county officials.
 Assist in forming non-profit corporations to sponsor low-income housing for sale or rent.

Establish a permanent emergency housing program to provide temporary help for those persons with immediate shelter needs."

The projected Three Year Goal regarding HOUSING is as follows:

"Utilize all potential public and private housing programs and see that they operate in Washington County."

Based on the recognized needs for housing, as known and stated in the statistics above, and in our own area councils priorities and the projected CAA goals for the coming program year, we were heartened to read of the recent success of the Inter-faith Non-profit Housing Corporation, formed in February, 1969, as a joint effort of Bethany Presbyterian Church and St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church.

We asked permission to use parts of the article from St. Bartholomew's December newsletter, "The Byliner", and they were glad to cooperate.

FIRST INTERFAITH NON-PROFIT HOUSING CORPORATION HOME NEARS COMPLETION:

The first home to be built with the assistance of the Interfaith Non-profit Housing Corporation will be completed in the near future, according to Mr. Earl Chalfan.

In his report on the progress of the program to the November board meeting of the Women of St. Bart's, Mr. Chalfan said the new home will be occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Juan Gutierrez and their six children.

Mr. Chalfan described in detail the numerous difficulties which had been encountered during the past months in securing the financing for the home, and related the frustrations and setbacks with which he has had to deal in meeting Washington County building specifications. Mr. and Mrs. Chalfan resorted to seeking help from our congressmen, and were helped particularly by Senator Packwood's office. After fighting a tremendous amount of red tape, the \$16,200 loan was finally approved in October. A letter from Edith Green to the Chalfans was read to the Women's Board expressing her interest and appreciation.

Further help is being given to the Gutierrez family by providing a partial loan for needed furniture. This loan was for \$95.00, and \$50.00 is to be repaid beginning no sooner than three months from now.

This new home is just the first of many homes the organization hopes to build. Already there are several families on a waiting list, eager for the same assistance the Gutierrez family received. The Interfaith Non-profit Housing Corporation is government approved and operates on a system of reimbursement, with its purpose being - to provide low-cost housing for needy families in Washington County. "
