COMMENTS - STATEWIDE EMPLOYMENT - SEPTEMBER 1982

LUMBER & WOOD PRODUCTS: Little change was evident in September. Both unadjusted and seasonally adjusted employment rose 100 over the month. With order files for many firms running skimpy at best, mills continue to react to the economy with closures both temporary and long term. The sobering result is that employment is 6,700 below year ago levels. International Paper began closing its Vaughn operations, laying off approximately 100 workers. Roseburg Lumber reopened one of its plants following a temporary closure, returning 440 to work.

OTHER DURABLES: Other Durables employment has fallen 11% (9,300) over the year. Transportation Equipment was able to post a 500 increase in employment over the month. The upward push was due to an upward fluctuation of 800 in Ship Building & Repair, offsetting small losses elsewhere in this sector. Machinery and Instruments & Related Products were not so fortunate as each lost 400 and 300, respectively. A lack of orders was given as the reason for the decline in these areas.

FOOD & KINDRED PRODUCTS: Some good news! Total employment exceeded month and year ago levels by 300 and 500 respectively. Seasonally adjusted employment also rose 200 over the month as food processing edged up to its annual peak in activity. A portion of the month to month improvement can be credited to Meat Products, which climbed nearly 200 as Oregon Turkey Growers reported an increase in production activity for the month.

OTHER NONDURABLES: Unadjusted employment fell 500, as did the seasonally adjusted level. Much of the downturn can be traced to Paper & Allied Products, which fell 400 over the month. Reductions at the Oregon City Division of Publishers Paper accounted for 300 of the decline. A three week shutdown was necessary to reduce excess inventories of newsprint. The soft demand for newsprint is something that reportedly will not go away anytime soon and is expected to be a factor in production schedules industry wide.

CONSTRUCTION: In spite of the recent completion of refueling and repair activities at the Trojan nuclear power plant, which affected approximately 400 workers, total Construction employment rose 500. Seasonally adjusted employment also picked up 300 over the month. Home Repair and Electrical work led the list of gainers (400 & 200). No large projects or general increase in building activity was noted as responsible for September's increase.

TRANSPORTATION, COMMUNICATIONS & UTILITIES: One would expect relative stability of a sector dominated by large Communications and Utilities firms. However, the steady decline of employment over the long term (down 4,200 from a year ago) reflects some secondary effects of Oregon's sagging economy. Sluggish business and construction activity have led to reduced demand for these services.

TRADE: Some bad news! While total employment climbed 500 over the month, seasonally adjusted employment actually fell 3,100. The decline is due to less than expected hiring in preparation for fall Retail business and the continued weakness in Wholesale Trade. Retail Trade rose 800 over the month. This compares with an average August-September increase of 2,000 over the last 5 years. Wholesale Trade of Durable Goods remained sluggish with Lumber & Construction and Electrical Goods falling 300 and 200.

FINANCE, INSURANCE & REAL ESTATE: As goes the economy, so goes Financial and Real Estate establishments. Banking & Credit Agencies continue their slow retreat in response to the sluggish economy. Reason for the slow, long term decline in employment was attributed to cutbacks from attrition where possible, as opposed to any large scale layoffs. Real Estate accounted for 600 of the total decline. Total seasonally adjusted employment fell 300 over the month.

GOVERNMENT: With school employees returning for the '82-'83 school year, total education employment rose 11,200 over the month. The increase was partially offset by a decline in other government employment in response to declining revenues. Most sobering is the 6,400 drop in total Government employment during the past year.

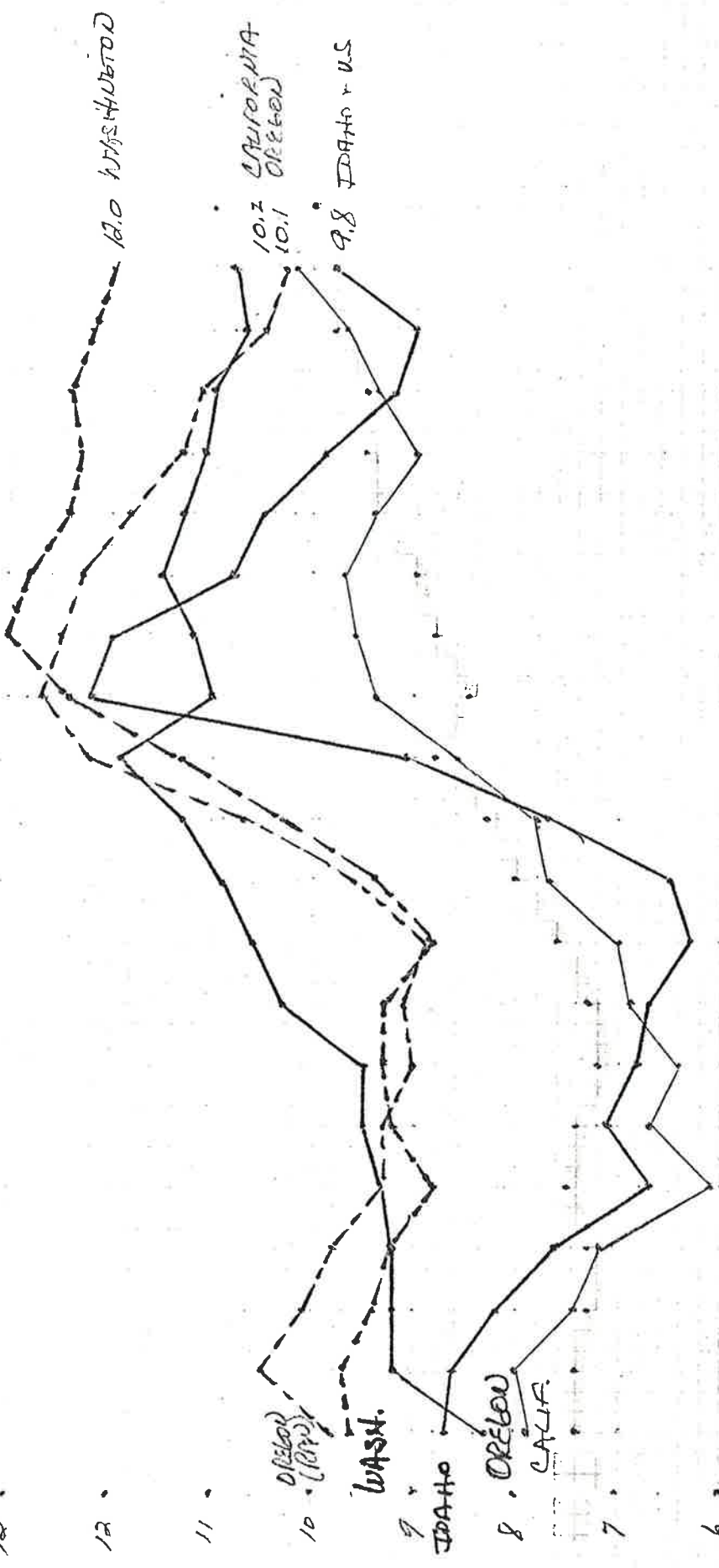
