

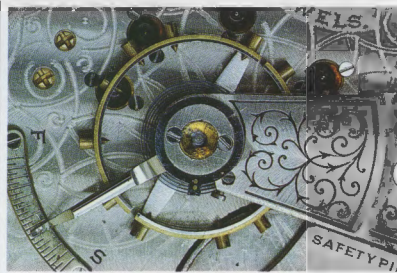
What's big about a small university?

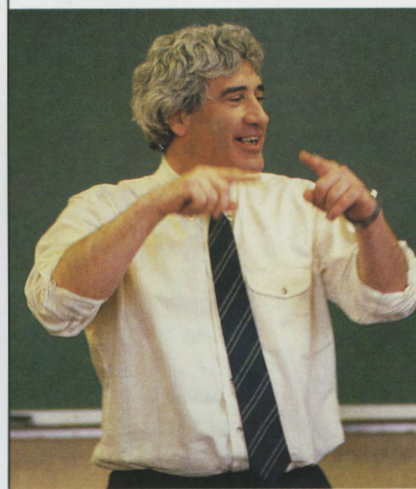
Professors with a professional focus on you.

Career planning and placement.

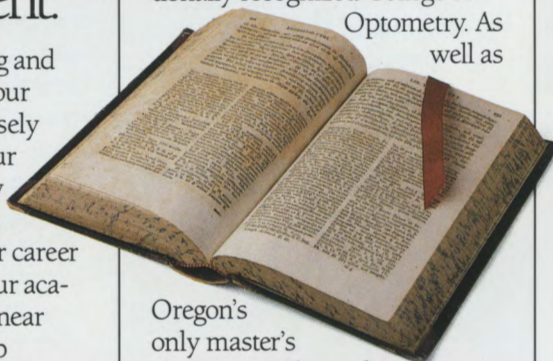

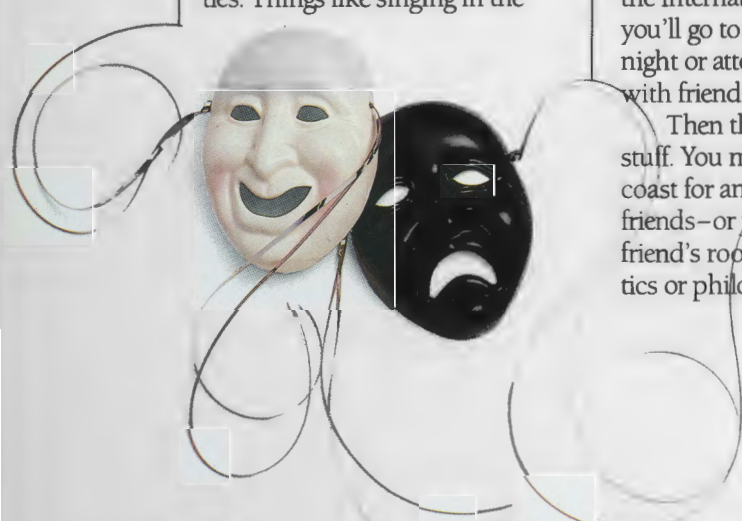
Then there's the everyday stuff. You might take off to the coast for an afternoon with some friends—or just hang out in a friend's room, discussing politics or philosophy over pizza.

These are the programs that can help make the difference between a liberal arts program and a professional liberal arts program. Programs that give you invaluable, hands-on experience.

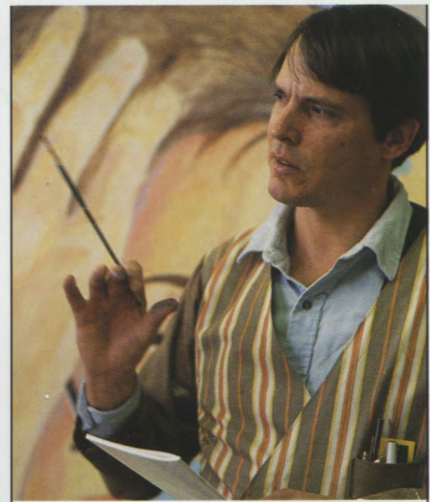

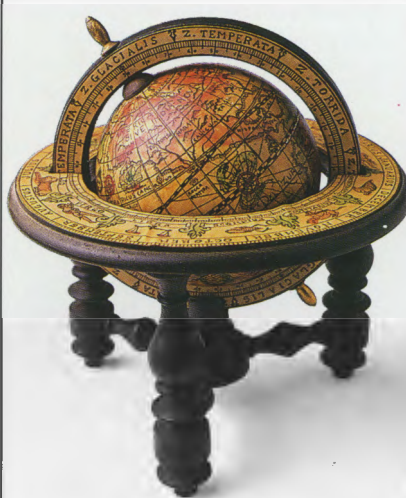
Pacific Honors Program.

Our honors program provides opportunities for interdisciplinary study for qualified juniors and seniors. It also provides the chance to join faculty members at their homes for dinner and discussions. The program includes special individual tutorial, seminars and research with a member of the faculty. Applications to the Honors Program are made in your freshman or sophomore year. It is an outstanding opportunity for academically talented students.

Malheur Field Station.

This special Pacific-operated study center in one of the nation's largest wildlife preserves, gives you a special opportunity to spend four days to three weeks living, laughing and working together with other students and faculty on a va-

riety of subjects. Courses are offered at Malheur during the summer and at various times during the academic year.



Peace and Conflict Studies (PACS).

This course of study examines the causes, nature and solutions to international and personal conflict. The courses are taught by faculty from several departments. Students are encouraged to develop a philo-

sophical position on peace and conflict that can have lifelong application.

Facts and figures about getting in.

At Pacific, we believe a valuable part of what you learn, you learn from each other. Consequently, each year we work hard to build a diverse student body; a group that grows together through all four years here.

On your application, we look beyond academic records. We look for the person behind them. Your ambitions, talents, and achievements are all considered. We also look at challenging courses you have taken and anything else that shows leadership capabilities, integrity, determination, or a strong desire for a solid liberal arts and sciences education.

Criteria for admission include:

Freshman.

High school course work; grade point average; SAT, WPCT or ACT scores; counselor recommendation; recommended

interview; and extra-curricular activities are all taken into consideration.

Transfers.

Strength of academic program is given strong consideration. Transfer students receive full credit for most academic courses at the baccalaureate level completed with a 'C' grade or better. Test scores (SAT or ACT) and a high school transcript are required of all transfer applicants with less than one year of full-time credit.

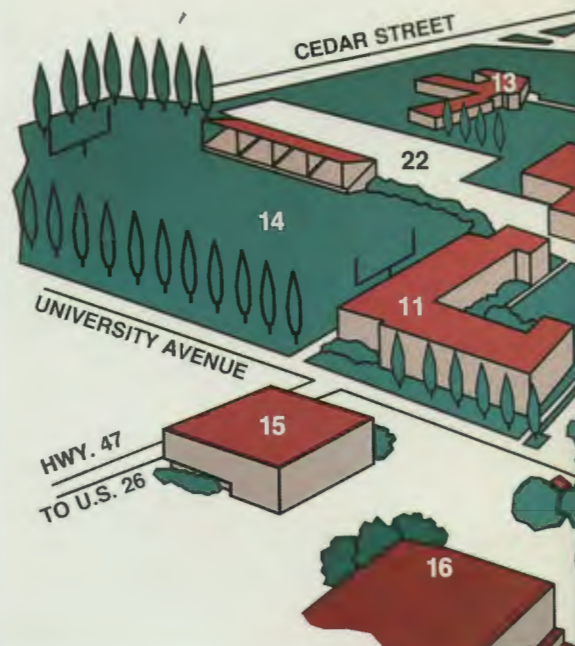

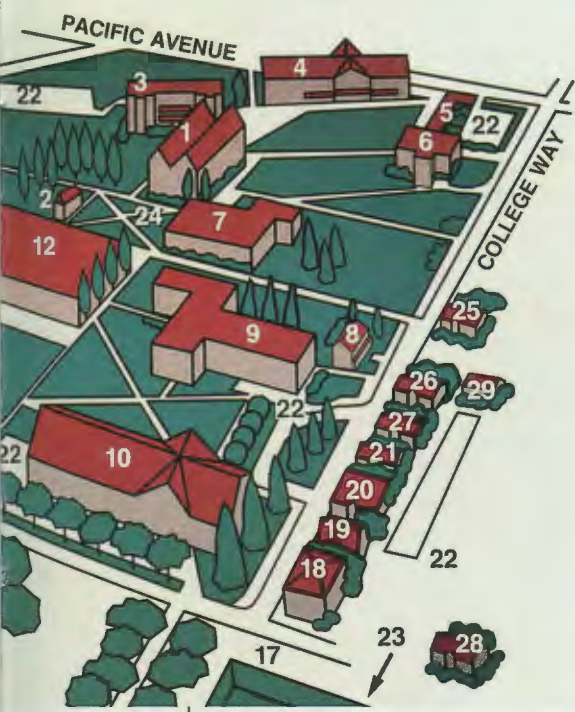

Financial aid.

Pacific's commitment to high-quality education for students of all economic backgrounds is most evident in our awarding of financial assistance.

We do our best to meet the demonstrated need of every admitted student. In 1986-87, more than 900 students received \$8 million in financial aid from Pacific. In other words, more than 80% of our students received scholarships, loans, campus employment or a combination of these.

Students applying for financial aid should submit their Financial Aid Form (FAF) to the College Scholarship Service as soon as possible after January 1, requesting that a copy be sent to Pacific. *It is not necessary to wait until you are admitted to Pacific.* The FAF may be obtained from any secondary school or college counselor, or from the Student Financial Assistance Office at Pacific. Transfer students must request a financial aid transcript from each college or university formerly attended.

The financial assistance resources of Pacific will be used to help make up the difference between the family contribution recommended by the College Scholarship Service and the cost of a year's attendance at Pacific. Financial assistance is renewable.

Application deadlines.

Applications are accepted on a rolling admissions basis from November 1. Interested freshman and transfer students are encouraged to apply early. Priority will be given to applications completed by April 15 for fall term.

Professional program applicants who have completed most of the pre-professional prerequisites should contact the Office of Admission for Professional Programs for application packets and deadline dates.

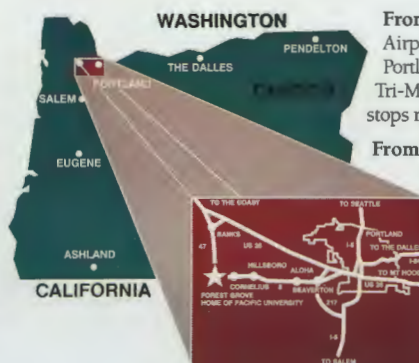
Pacific students value individuality. They like being treated as individuals—not numbers. They want their education to be exciting and challenging. More importantly, they want it to be something that fits them.

Directions to campus:



From airport by bus—take the Downtown Airporter service to 5th Avenue in downtown Portland, then take the #57 bus (Portland's Tri-Met bus service) to Forest Grove. (The bus stops right in front of the campus.)

From Portland by car—take Highway 26 west to Route 6 (Forest Grove/Tillamook). Continue south on Route 47 (Banks/Forest Grove) approximately nine miles to the campus.

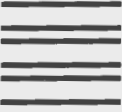

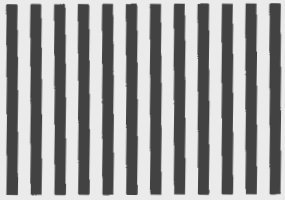
