## ANNUAL TRYOUT FOR TEAMS FOR IDAHO-PACIFIC DEBATE HELD

Brighton Chapel Scene of Lively Contest—Nine Aspirants for Coveted Positions—Two Old Debators Make Team.



Friday evening the annual try-out was held and the teams chosen who will help win the championship in debate from Moscow next January. An audience composed chiefly of college students and faculty listened attentively to nine candidates as they each tore down points made by their predecessor and presented their own conclusive arguments. The question was "Resolved that labor unions should be incorporated." The affirmative was upheld by Messrs. Bereman, Grathwell, Taylor and Bishop; those for the negative were Messrs. Ostrander, Austin, Olsen, Benjamin and Ned Livingston. The speeches were each twelve minutes. All of the candidates did so well that the results were very doubtful. After a few minutes of suspense the decision of the judges was read by Prof. Taylor. Those chosen were Messrs. Benjamin, Bishop, Grathwell and Taylor. Messrs. Bereman and Austin won places as alternates. The judges were Prin. Bates, Prof. Shippee, and Prof. Harrington.

Those who did not win places should not be discouraged for they are the ones who will be called up-

on in the future to maintain and prove Pacific's enviable reputation in debating. With such good material there is no doubt that P. U. will always make good.

Pacific has an especially strong team this year. Benjamin and Taylor upheld the affirmative last year in the debate with Moscow. They have had profitable experience and we can expect great things from them this year. Mr. Grathwell, altho new here this fall, is already well-known for his ability as an orator and is certain to make a splendid debater. Mr. Bishop shows very good possibilities in making a name for himself outside the laboratory. All are well known as members of Gamma Sigma, as are the alternates also.

This year is the decisive year in debate for Pacific since it is the last year of the three-year contract with Moscow. The contest is now very close but Pacific has very good chances of winning. The boys certainly deserve the help and encouragement of the whole student body. Prof. Harrington will again coach the team this year.
