

# Ex-Hi Grid Stars Mix Here Friday

**Rook-Frosh Clash  
Expected to Be Wide  
Open Football Clash**

Despite the ineffectiveness of the far-famed "T" formation against Oregon State's Beavers Saturday at Corvallis, the rail-birds in that college town are looking forward to a new brew of "T" when Oregon State college's freshman football team locks horns with the University of Oregon frosh in Multnomah stadium Friday night at 8 o'clock.

It was the Rook team that tested the varsity's "T" defense, shortly before the historic clash Saturday, and so good was its interpretation of the formation that Frosh Coach Bill McKalip may decide to toss a little Rook "T" at the Frosh, with ex-Jefferson Star Bill Nickoloff tagged for the important quarterbacking post, the same post that Frankie Albert handles for Stanford.

Nickoloff's passing has been on the sensational side in pre-game drills and Corvallis observers predict a cinch varsity berth for the alert, shifty-hipped ex-Portland star next season.

Another freshman who will bear watching is Vernon Stiner, a distant cousin of Beaver Coach Lon Stiner. Out of a Nebraska high school, Stiner is rated one of the best linemen ever turned out in his high school. With a forward wall bulwarked by huge LaMarr Wilcox, the Oregon State Rooks are "tough people" on anybody's football field.

Meanwhile, Oregon's frosh quietly go about the task of building a squad that will take the Rooks apart. In 42 games between the two schools, the Frosh have been triumphant 23 times, dismayed 13 times and knotted six times. Which speaks pretty well for the Frosh's ability to take care of themselves on the pigskin battlefield.

The Ducklings will be led in offense by ex-Portland Star Bob Morrison, who wore both track togs and moleskin during his four years at Grant high school. Morrison is one of the fastest backs in the two schools at present and promises to cause the Rooks a headache or two before hostilities cease. In other backfield spots will be Bobby Reynolds, Jefferson's sensational Negro ball-carrier; Dick Signor, line-pounder from Lincoln, and Don Mayne, another Jefferson and Eric Waldorf-coached halfback.

Vic Atiyeh, ex-Washington left guard, will provide one of the most formidable walls in the Frosh front line and will be assisted by several other Portland and Oregon 1940 prep stars.

Game time is 8 p. m. and tickets will not be reserved. The admission is 50 cents for adults and 30 cents for students and soldiers.

# Frosh Teams Await Gun Here Friday

**'Little Civil War'  
to See Ducklings and  
Rooks in First Action**

Oregon's "Little Civil War," annual football classic involving the University of Oregon and Oregon State college freshman football teams, will swing into action Friday at 8 p. m. in Multnomah stadium.

Jam-packed with former Portland prep pigskin warriors, freshman teams of both schools will be meeting for the first time this season. Another game will be played later in the year at Corvallis.

Bill McKalip's Oregon State Rooks have a pair of former Portland all-city gridsters in their ranks who figure mightily in the Rook offense and defense. LaMarr ("The Great Omar") Wilcox, 240-pound former Washington tackle, will be one of the bulwarks of the Rook forward wall, while Bill Nickoloff, Jefferson's shifty pass-throwing quarterback, promises to be a constant threat on offense. Nickoloff, by the way, already has caught the eye of Varsity Mentor Lon Stiner, and reports circulating on the Corvallis campus currently put Nickoloff in one of the ball-throwing posts when the Beavers open their 1942 scrimmages.

At Eugene the varsity-to-be will be depending upon Vic Atiyeh, former all-city Washington high guard, who Freshman Coach John Warren predicts will be a cinch for a varsity post in another year. In backfield the Frosh will have Bob Morrison, Grant's fleet-footed halfback, and Bob Signor, Lincoln high school's tricky ball-toter.

Actually, the annual frosh classic is a preview of the varsity squads of both schools, for usually the same freshmen who plod dirt in the little civil war are the ones who make up the bulk of the varsity squads in the next two seasons.

Although neither coach has divulged any tips on proposed tactics, action usually is of the red-hot variety and this year certainly will prove no exception to the rule.

Stadium gates will open at approximately 7 p. m. and no seats will be reserved.
