Dear "Mama"

I was made happy in receiving your letter today and Clifford's picture, and I was made sad too. I just felt like letting go "all knots" and going home to you. It just struck me in the heart when you said Clifford looked sad when you asked him where Papa was. Of course he does not grieve, but I presume he wonders in his little mind why Papa don't come. I take spells of feeling so very sad. I would not mind it so much were I at some active work, but shut up in the house day after day writing re. makes it much harder to bear. We hope to get through next week. Want to get the Annual Reports off next Tuesday. Mr Sampson came last evening. Says his girl baby is a mate to human. He left here the Saturday before we got back, at 4 o'clock in the evening. Went to Linnemasho that night, and reached The Dalles at 1 o'clock next night. After eating lunch and

visiting some went to bed, but before he fairly got to sleep  
had to <sup>get up</sup> go for the Doctor, and the babe was born about 4 o'clock,  
Pretty close call. He has made out his application for the  
Sinemasho school, and will go out in the morning. If he  
gets in again Mrs I will likely be motion for Mrs Williams  
expects to quit at end of this quarter. Herrman sent out word  
that if I did not need him at 1<sup>st</sup> of Sept he would remain a  
few days after that date. I shall send him word to stay his  
month out. I mean to start school even if there are not many  
scholars. Mr Luckey & I are going to tell the Indians that the  
Gov wants 10 months school and if they dont send in or leave  
their children 1<sup>st</sup> of Sept - the school will have to run into next  
July. Last year the school commenced Sept 23. I have no word  
from Slaver & Walker or Land office. I hardly look for a letter  
very soon from S.W. I shall write to Land office again next week  
if I dont get word by Monday. The bedbugs are so bad in the Kammari  
house that Sam is sleeping in the bed Pa slept in. He says  
it is the best place he has found to sleep since he came to the  
Agency. Geo McCoy is here dussing the mill stones. Mr Starr went  
up to Sinemasho yesterday to stay while McCoy is here. Old Sally &  
Mrs Peis got those rags ye yesterday. Sallie asked about you & Mrs M's  
& her babe. Says she said it would be a girl, and yours will be too.  
We have huckle berries every meal now. If I can get some good  
fresh ones next week Monday, I will send you some by express.  
Well Good night. and may heaven for you care and our darling
