

Warm Springs Agency Or

Aug 9 1890

Dear Mary

I will write a few lines this morning so that you may find a letter there when you get home. I am feeling pretty well. I was glad it cleared up a little and turned some cooler yesterday P.M. I brought up about a gallon of berries & gave some to Mrs J & some to Mr Quakey. I took dinner with Mrs J and ate some bread & milk at her table last evening. I will take breakfast there this morning. I got no word from Staver & Walker I wrote them quite a long letter, showing the advantages of Albany, &c. I am hassled more about the ranch. I have written to the Dallas land office to see if I can pure up without going back on to the place. I about as soon Sam would not take me up. There is fully 20 tons hay. I have been counting up the cattle and find there has been seen of yours & mine this spring 20 head, and 8

head that have not been seen of yours and
one of Pas the white B. also a head of Ellens
that have been seen. If I can get a little to the
place I know I can get more than 1500.

I righted up our room some yesterday. It came
over me the most when I folded up Clifford's
bed and put it away. I have not felt very
lonesome so far, and trust I will not.

Mr Luckey got a letter from The Dalles from a
man on his way to Punnett, F Dillard Hobman
of Salem, saying he had applied for the Superintendency
of the Warm Springs Agency school, to the Commissioner
and had as endorsers. Gov Pennington, Geo M Bruce
M P Deady Henry Fading, Isaac Bush, & W Ladd

Mr I wrote him there was no vacancy, and he thought
he could get the Punnett school at 12.00. I won't
worry me much. If he gets in here all right,
well I must close, but add that Mrs J will
sleep down stairs, but is to use my name room
during the day. Love to all and lots for
your self & Clifford.
