My Dear Uncle Eymon

Your letter of
Aug 21st, mailed by you Sept 1st at hand.

Your letters of July 12th, 13th, &
14th, were also rec'd in good time. On the next
of these last, I cancelled your note and put it
away with one dollar (that you sent more
than was necessary), and told that I would
take time within a day or two, and return
them with a letter. But I have been
very busy, and time has passed very rapidly,
so here I am with a quite lame excuse,
which notwithstanding, I beg you to accept.

I now enclose them herein
and hope they will reach you in good
time. We here, are all in usual
health, running along in just about the
same hum drum way with nothing particularly
new. Ma and Father, and we all think
of your visit with great pleasure, and

wish to be remembered affectionately to you
and yours, and shall be very glad to
hear from you as you have the
time & inclination. Remember me par-
-ticularly to William, & say to him, that I
hope some day to see the big River, trees,
&c, that he told us about. I again
beg you to forgive my carelessness in the
note matter
