Over the past year, you and other members of the Washington County community have given generously to support our efforts in helping families in crisis, preventing destitution and building self-reliance. Together, we have provided:

- 95,751 hot meals
- 20,829 food baskets
- 17,669 bed nights of emergency shelter
- housing services for 15,745 low income people
- utility assistance for 8,614 low income people
- weatherization services to 202 families to prevent heat loss and reduce costs
- rent assistance to 208 low income families to help maintain their residences and prevent homelessness
- family based, comprehensive social services for 829 families to achieve increased levels of economic and social self-reliance.
- numerous educational programs covering subjects such as parenting, energy conservation, budgeting and substance abuse that reached over 1,000 low income families
- 368 hours of child care so low income families could gain access to needed social services.
- education, nutrition, health and social services to 347 three and four year olds to help prepare them to succeed in school.
- information and referrals to 14,418 callers needing emergency and basic needs assistance.
